Academic Transformation Plan

Mid-year curriculum update

Assistant Superintendent for Teaching & Learning Greg Wolcott recently shared with the Board of Education the annual mid-year curriculum update that provided updates and highlights on current year initiatives and shared instructional plans and recommendations for the 2023-24 school year.

District FOCUS: Focused on "Creating engagement through meaningful experiences"; emphasized implementation of the Gradual Release of Responsibility (GRR) instructional framework; began implementation of items from the special education audit

Culturally Responsive Teaching & Leading Standards: Held monthly Culturally Responsive Teaching and Leading committee meetings with representation from all schools; members of the Culturally Responsive Teaching and Leading Committee co-facilitated professional learning for all staff during four school improvement days

English Language Arts: Refined units to meet rigorous standards and student needs; provided systematic and strategic supports to students; set up cross-grade level "shadowing" of students between the elementary and junior high and the junior high and high school

Math: Trained elementary staff at all schools in the Thinking Classrooms in Mathematics concepts; district-wide book study about building fact fluency; created a math advisory meeting (21 teachers from all elementary schools and all grades); provided systematic and strategic supports to students via a new differentiated engagement block (DEB) at the elementary level

Science/Social studies: Visited several school districts to view social studies resources in action; initiated a pilot of the InquirED Journeys curriculum in social studies at grades three through five; began looking for ways to deepen inquiry instruction in the primary grades

This program offers a play-based, developmentally appropriate curriculum and is supported by certified teachers, teaching assistants, and other specialists. Families must complete the preschool screening process in order to be considered for a classroom space, and students with the greatest risk are prioritized following guidelines from the Illinois State Board

Kindergarten Pre-Registration

Do you have a student eligible for kindergarten attendance for the 2023-24 school year? If so, mark your calendar for Woodridge School District 68's kindergarten pre-registration to be held on Wednesday, April 5 from3:30-6:30pm. Register at your child's home elementary school.

Children must be five years of age on or before September 1, 2023, and the student's birth certificate must be presented. Children currently enrolled in the blended preschool program need not attend, but will need to complete returning student registration.

Multilingual Services: Implemented new newcomer protocol designed in January 2022; received record number of newcomers to the country

Special Education: Implementation of co-teaching model throughout the district with increased access to grade-level standards for students

with disabilities; ongoing coaching to support co-teaching practices and the implementation of specially designed instruction in general education environments; requested five additional learning behavior specialists in order to effectively meet the needs of our students with Individualized Education Plans

Native Plant Bed Funding

Meadowview after-school gardening club receives Lorrie Otto Seeds for Education Grant

Meadowview Elementary School's after-school gardening club, led by teacher Kim Martin, has been working to maintain the school's native plant bed. This fall students in the club helped design a plan to expand the native bed and applied for a grant to help fund the project. Ms. Martin

recently received notice the grant proposal had been approved.


The students' plan will be implemented this spring with funds from the Lorrie Otto Seeds for Education Grant Program (SFE) administered by Wild Ones. The students involved will learn about the benefits of native plants while

getting a close-up view of butterflies, songbirds and other creatures that use these plants for vital food or shelter.

"I am excited to share my love of native plants with my students. Native plants are affordable, easy to maintain, and very beneficial to the environment. A lot of the students helping with the project are gardening for the first time. I am hoping that they will learn some basic skills to make their lives a little 'greener,'" said Martin.

For more than 20 years, Wild Ones has awarded Seeds for Education grants to youth-serving organizations for acquiring native plants and seeds for outdoor learning areas that engage youth (preschool to high school) directly in planning, planting and caring for native plant gardens throughout the United States. Wild Ones is a nationally recognized, member-

ship-based non-profit organization with a mission to promote environmentally sound landscaping practices to preserve biodiversity through the preservation, restoration and establishment of native plant communities.

National Board Certified Teachers

National Board Certification was designed to develop, retain and recognize accomplished teachers and to generate ongoing improvement in schools nationwide. It is the most respected professional certification available in K-12 education.

Woodridge School District 68 educators Maggie Hock, math teacher at Thomas Jefferson Junior High, Rhonda Jackson, kindergarten teacher at John L. Sipley Elementary School, and Lisa Wise, gifted specialist at Goodrich Elementary School have each recently renewed their National Board Certification through the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

Maggie Hock renewed her certification in Mathematics - Early Adolescence. "I am happy to have completed my NBCT renewal because the process allows you to evaluate your teaching practices and pushes you to be a better educator," said Hock. "I like the way it challenges you to think about how and what you are teaching and requires you to plan, teach, and assess with purpose."

Rhonda Jackson renewed her National Board certification in Literacy: Reading/Language Arts - Early and Middle Childhood. "I feel a great sense of accomplishment that I was able to renew my certificate and demonstrate all the new things that I have learned since my initial certification," said Jackson. "The staff and students that I work with each day teach me so many things about myself as an educator and allow me to continue to grow."

Lisa Wise renewed her certification in Literacy: Reading/ Language Arts - Early and Middle Childhood. "Renewing my National Board brings me great joy as it is a reminder of why I obtained my National Board in the first place," said Wise. "National Board has made me the reflective teacher I am today which has allowed me to know and understand my students' learning needs."

National Board Certification is achieved through a rigorous, performance-based assessment of a teacher's pedagogical skills and content knowledge. A comprehensive study by the nonpartisan National Research Council found that students taught by Board Certified Teachers make higher gains on achievement tests than students taught by non-certified teachers.

New playgrounds at 2 schools

New playground equipment will be coming this fall to Murphy and Edgewood Schools. Woodridge Park District staff collaborated with the Woodridge 68 administrative team and each school's principal as well as getting feedback from students and staff. The final selection of the new playground equipment was determined through an online survey for teachers and students to select their favorite playground design.

The proposed work includes renovations of the existing playground areas and site improvements consistent with park standards. Because of a long-standing intergovernmental partnership between Woodridge 68 and Woodridge Park District, the playground replacement costs will be funded cooperatively by both entities.

Construction is expected to begin in June 2023, with the non-profit organization Kids Around the World removing the existing structures to refurbish and reuse them in an under-served community as part of an international mission project. These playground replacement improvements are targeted to be finished before the 2023-24 school year begins.
